# Providing opportunities for tamariki to revisit learning

We often notice tamariki spontaneously revisiting their learning through their play. Sometimes it can be quite literally tamariki looking through their learning journals and revisiting past learning stories of their development or special events in the centre. Sometimes, it can look like tamariki repeatedly creating with the same set of resources to create and re-create an environment. Sometimes we see it through repeated physical experiences such as riding bikes or hanging off the monkey bars. Sometimes it is the favourite story that has to be read on repeat! Whatever the experience, when tamariki are provided the opportunity to revisit their learning, they are working through trial and error, mastering their skills and building on their knowledge. Revising learning is important because it allows us to reflect on our experiences, learn about ourselves and make sense of the world. Kaiako recognise this as valuable learning and use intentional teaching strategies alongside tamariki to foster their love of revisiting learning.
